AUSTRALIA'S RELATIONSHIP WITH THE UNITED STATES REMAINS ONE OF THE MOST IMPORTANT PARTNERSHIPS AVAILABLE FOR THIS NATION ACROSS DEFENCE, SECURITY, GEOPOLITICS, ENERGY, ENVIRONMENT, TRADE AND INVESTMENT.

United States investment in Australia surpasses that of China, and serves as the nation's leading economic partner in multiple dimensions. While this has been the case throughout the alliance, changes to global and economic factors means our nation faces much uncertainty, revealing challenges as well as opportunities moving forward.

This year, 2021, marks the 70th anniversary of the ANZUS Treaty, signed in San Francisco in 1951. The alliance remains the foundation of defence and security cooperation between the two countries, providing Australia with access to leading defence hardware and technologies.

In a time when the public are questioning long-standing institutions and their relevance, a recent poll conducted by the Lowy Institute indicates a remarkable level of support for Australia's security alliance with the United States, with 72% of Australians considering the alliance 'very' or 'fairly' important for the nation's security. This level of public support should not pave the way for complacency, and it is imperative for both countries to continue to nurture the alliance as it finds a place in today's challenging global environment.

The Alliance Network, supported by the Embassy of The United States of America and the UWA Defence and Security Institute, is designed to bring together influential leaders currently specialising in regional security, economics or public policy to discuss the state of the relationship and to explore new areas of knowledge.

We look forward to a thought-provoking discussion drawing on current alliance issues and the future of this important relationship.



Tom Corben is a Research Associate in the Foreign Policy and Defence Program at the United States Studies Centre. He was previously a resident Lloyd and Lilian Vasey Fellow with Pacific Forum in Hawaii, where he focused on Japanese and Korean politics and foreign policy, and Australia's engagement with Northeast Asia. Tom has published widely on these issues for a range of platforms, including The Diplomat, East Asia Forum, and The Strategist.

Tom has been a tutor in Australian Foreign Policy at the University of New South Wales and is a Pacific Forum Young Leader.

Tom holds a BA (Honours) in Asian Studies and International Relations from the University of New South Wales and undertook an exchange at Kyung Hee University in Seoul, South Korea.

Professor Peter J. Dean is Chair of Defence Studies, Director of the UWA Defence and Security Institute and a Senior Fellow at the Perth USAsia Centre. Prior to the commencement of this role Professor Dean was Pro Vice-Chancellor (Education) at UWA. He has been a Fulbright Professional Fellow and Endeavour Research Scholar in Australia-United States Alliance Studies, as well as a non-resident fellow with the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) and the Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Studies at Georgetown University in Washington D.C. Professor Dean was the founding editor of the Melbourne University Press Defence Studies Series, is a member of the Editorial Board of the Australian Army Journal, Global War Studies and the Military Studies Journal and a former managing editor of the journal Security Challenges. An international award winning author, his most recent book (with Brendan Taylor and Stephan Frühling) is After American Primacy: Imagining the Future of Australia's Defence, (Melbourne University Press, 2019).



JENNIFER JACKETT

Jennifer Jackett is a Non-Resident Fellow in the Foreign Policy and Defence Program at the United States Studies Centre. She is on leave from the Australian Government while pursuing a PhD as a Sir Roland Wilson Scholar at the Australian National University. Her research examines US-China competition for leadership over advanced technologies and the implications for US allies.

Jennifer has experience advising government on issues including critical infrastructure, foreign interference, counterterrorism, international defence engagement. Jennifer holds a Master of National Security Policy from the Australian National University and a Bachelor of Liberal Studies (First Class Honours and University Medal) from Sydney University.





PROFESSOR SIMON JACKMAN
CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER
UNITED STATES STUDIES CENTRE

Professor Simon Jackman commenced as Chief Executive Officer of the United States Studies Centre in April 2016.

Born and raised in Brisbane, he received his PhD in Political Science from the University of Rochester, and for most of his academic career was Professor of Political Science and Statistics at Stanford University.

A leading scholar of public opinion, election campaigns, political participation, and electoral systems, Jackman's academic work spans both American and Australian politics. A methodological pioneer, Jackman has made important contributions to the rigorous measurement of democracy, the analysis of legislative roll call data, and improving on-line surveys of public opinion.

Jackman's scientific leadership includes serving as a Principal Investigator of the American National Election Studies (the world's longest-running and most authoritative survey of political behaviour and attitudes) and President of the Society for Political Methodology. He is a Fellow of the Society for Political Methodology, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia.

DR LAVINA LEE
SENIOR LECTURER, DEPARTMENT OF MODERN HISTORY,

Dr Lavina Lee is a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Modern History, Politics and International Relations at Macquarie University, Sydney. She is the author of the book *US Hegemony and International Legitimacy: Norms Power and Followership in the Wars on Iraq* (Routledge, 2010), and has published numerous articles, book chapters and commentary on Indian foreign and security policy, nuclear proliferation, US foreign policy, and security relations in the Indo-Pacific. Her current research focuses on maritime security and strategy in the Indo-Pacific region, and nuclear proliferation in East Asia.





HERVÉ LEMAHIEU DIRECTOR, POWER AND DIPLOMACY PROGRAM LOWY INSTITUTE

Hervé Lemahieu is Director of the Power and Diplomacy Program at the Lowy Institute. His research focusses on the implications of Asia's economic transformation for war, peace and the global balance of power in the twenty-first century.

Among other projects, Hervé directs the annual Asia Power Index, which is a data-driven assessment he developed in 2018 to map the changing distribution of power in the region. He also oversees the Global Diplomacy Index, an interactive tool launched by the Institute in 2016, which maps the most significant diplomatic networks globally.

Hervé's interests include Australian foreign policy, middle powers and geo-economics, global governance and multilateralism, and Southeast Asian politics with a focus on Myanmar. He also co-chairs the track 1.5 Australia-France and Australia-European Union Strategic Dialogues.

Hervé joined Lowy from the London-based International Institute for Strategic Studies where he was Research Associate for Political Economy and Security. In an earlier role at Oxford Analytica he consulted on early warning and geopolitical risk for governments and international organisations.


Hervé holds an MSc in Global Governance and Diplomacy from the University of Oxford, and an MA in International Relations and Modern History from the University of St Andrews. He grew up in Myanmar.

DONALD MAYNARD PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICER U.S. CONSULATE GENERAL. SYDNEY

Donald Maynard joined the U.S. Foreign Service in 2005 after working for many years for a range of civil society organizations. Prior to arrival in Pakistan, Donald served as the PAO at the U.S. consulate General in Sydney. From 2015 – 2017, he served as the Public Affairs Officer at the U.S. Mission to UNESCO.

From 2013 - 2014 Donald served as the Deputy Press Attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad. He has also served in a number of positions specialising in public diplomacy and public affairs in Brasilia, London, and New Delhi.

He was born and raised in Norfolk, Virginia, and is a graduate of Old Dominion University.



NATASHA KASSAM

DIRECTOR, PUBLIC OPINION AND FOREIGN POLICY PROGRAM LOWY INSTITUTE

Natasha Kassam is Director of the Lowy Institute's Public Opinion and Foreign Policy Program. She is a former Australian diplomat, researching Australia's Indo-Pacific strategy, China's domestic politics, Taiwan, and Australia-China relations. She is also a Fellow of the ANU National Security College's Futures Council for 2020-21. Natasha is a regular contributor to Australian and international media outlets including CNN, BBC, Bloomberg, CNBC and the New York Times. Prior to joining the Lowy Institute, Natasha was responsible for government policy on human rights and legal issues in China, and she drafted the Australian government's 2017 Foreign Policy White Paper. Natasha was also a law and justice advisor to the Regional Assistance Mission to Solomon Islands (RAMSI) in Honiara. She holds a Bachelor of Laws (Hons I) and a Bachelor of International Studies from the University of Sydney and speaks Mandarin.



ASHLEY TOWNSHEND DIRECTOR, FOREIGN POLICY AND DEFENCE

Ashley Townshend is Director of Foreign Policy and Defence at the United States Studies Centre at the University of Sydney. He works on international security and strategic affairs with a focus on the Indo-Pacific, including regional alliances and partnerships, maritime security, defence policy, and US, Chinese, and Australian strategy. Ashley is also the founding convenor and co-chair of the US-Australia Indo-Pacific Deterrence Dialogue and a lecturer in the Centre's postgraduate program. A frequent contributor to the Australian and international media, Ashley's analysis has appeared in outlets such as the Financial Times, CNN, the Australian Financial Review, Bloomberg, ABC, and Sky News.

Previously, Ashley has held research and teaching positions in the Alliance 21 Program at the United States Studies Centre, the International Security Program at the Lowy Institute for International Policy, the Department of Government and International Relations at the University of Sydney, the Center for Asia-Pacific Cooperation and Governance at Fudan University, the Warrior-Scholar Project at Yale University, the Strategic and Defence Studies Centre at the Australian National University, and Pacific Friends of the Global Fund. He completed his studies at the University of Oxford, Peking University, Sciences Po, Paris, and the University of Sydney where he received the University Medal.



Susannah Patton is a Research Fellow in the Foreign Policy and Defence Program at the United States Studies Centre.

She joined the United States Studies Centre from the Australian government, where she was until 2020 a Senior Analyst in the Southeast Asia Branch at the Office of National Intelligence, Australia's peak intelligence assessment agency.

Susannah previously served in the ASEAN-Australia Special Summit Taskforce in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet and as a diplomat in the Australian Embassy in Bangkok.

Susannah holds first class honours degrees in law and political science from the Australian National University and speaks Thai.





DR MERRIDEN VARRALL DIRECTOR, AUSTRALIA GEOPOLITICS HUB KPMG AUSTRALIA

Dr Merriden Varrall is Director of the Australia Geopolitics Hub at KPMG, where she helps business understand and navigate the complex global geopolitical environment. She provides business-relevant insights into global, regional and local geopolitical trends and works with clients to develop strategies and solutions.

A former UN diplomat based in China, Merriden is a sought-after commentator on geopolitics, East Asia, China's foreign policy, and Australia's bilateral relationship with China.

From 2014-2018, Merriden was the Director of the Lowy Institute's East Asia Program. Before joining the Institute, Merriden was the Assistant Country Director and Senior Policy Advisor at United Nations Development Programme, China, where she worked on China's role in the world, focusing on its international development cooperation policy. Prior to that she worked for the Australian Government Treasury and the Department of Family and Community Services.

Merriden spent almost eight years living and working in China, including lecturing in foreign policy at the China Foreign Affairs University and conducting fieldwork for her doctoral research.

Merriden has a PhD examining Chinese foreign policy from Macquarie University, Sydney, and the Vrije Universiteit, Amsterdam. She has a Master's Degree in International Affairs from the Australian National University, and completed her undergraduate studies in international studies at the University of Technology Sydney. Her analyses have appeared in academic journals, as well as publications such as The Quarterly, The New York Times, Nikkei Asian Review, Foreign Policy, The East Asia Forum, and the Lowy Interpreter, among others.
