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WELCOME

IT IS OUR PLEASURE TO WELCOME NEXT GENERATION LEADERS TO THIS ADELAIDE WORKSHOP ON THE U.S. AUSTRALIA ALLIANCE

This workshop is part of a two-year program that involves three regional workshops held in Perth, Brisbane and Adelaide in 2020-2021. These workshops seek to engage young professionals in Australia with the potential to be the next generation of alliance leaders. We are looking for participants who will help shape the future of U.S.-Australia relations in the Indo-Pacific century. A select group from the regional workshops will have the opportunity to proceed to a national workshop in Canberra in 2021, and from that cohort, a final group will be chosen to attend a capstone workshop in Washington, DC.

The program introduces a group of approximately 55 young professionals to a range of alliance issues through workshop sessions, led by established academics and policymakers. Each workshop involves detailed discussions and presentations on topics such as:

- Shared values and democratic principles
- U.S.-Australia strategic relations
- Regional geopolitical issues and emerging security challenges
- U.S.-Australia cooperation on trade and economics
- Broader bilateral cooperation

The last sessions in each workshop focus on producing a joint statement to be issued by the participants that will focus on current and future issues for U.S.-Australia cooperation in the Indo-Pacific region. These statements will help guide and inform the discussion and sessions in the Canberra-based workshop.

These workshops come at an important time for the U.S.-Australia alliance. The depth of cooperation and agreements between the two countries has never been greater, and the Alliance now arcs well beyond the traditional areas of intelligence and security cooperation encompassing: trade and economics, shared values and people to people contacts. We live, though, in challenging geopolitical times. Terrorism persists and conflict in the Middle East is ongoing.

Revisionist powers are challenging the existing international order while 'the West' seems beset with its own problems from challenging economic conditions, domestic upheaval and the ongoing implications of COVID-19. In the Indo-Pacific, the rise of China has opened up major economic opportunities, while presenting new challenges to the rules-based international order and U.S. hegemony in the region. Australia has benefited enormously in economic terms from China's rise, while at the same time meeting new challenges in the face of shifting regional power. As one recent Australian prime minister noted, Australia's policies towards China are driven by two emotions: fear and greed.

Many of these issues are playing out in contemporary Australian debates, with a range of major political and industry figures calling for a more 'independent' Australian foreign policy, while others are pushing for deeper ties with Australia's traditional partners and allies. Lowy Institute opinion polling shows the Australian public is highly attuned to international debates and their impact on Australia. This era has raised new questions about the future of the U.S.-Australian alliance in domestic, bilateral and international contexts, highlighting the increasingly complex and multifaceted challenges

both countries face. For these workshops, we have brought together a range of key thinkers on regional security, economic questions and the U.S.-Australian alliance to address these issues and challenges. Held under the Chatham House Rule, we seek to engage participants in a candid and open debate in order to unpack the depth of engagement between Australia and the U.S., and shine light on contemporary challenges. We look forward to your active participation and lively discussion on how you seek to consider and shape the future of the U.S.-Australia alliance.

SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES



PROFESSOR PETER J. DEAN

DIRECTOR, UWA DEFENCE AND SECURITY INSTITUTE THE UNIVERSITY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Professor Peter J. Dean is Chair of Defence Studies, Director of the UWA Defence and Security Institute, and a Senior Fellow at the Perth USAsia Centre. Prior to the commencement of this role Professor Dean was Pro Vice-Chancellor (Education) at UWA. He has been a Fulbright Professional Fellow and Endeavour Research Scholar in Australia-United States Alliance Studies, as well as a non-resident fellow with the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) and the Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Studies at Georgetown University in Washington D.C. Professor Dean was the founding editor of the Melbourne University Press Defence Studies Series, is a member of the Editorial Board of the Australian Army Journal, Global War Studies and the Military Studies Journal, and a former managing editor of the journal Security Challenges. An international award-winning author, his most recent book (with Brendan Taylor and Stephan Fruhling) is After American Primacy: Imagining the Future of Australia's Defence, (Melbourne University Press, 2019).



THE HON. ALEXANDER DOWNER AC

EXECUTIVE CHAIR, INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL FOR GOVERNMENT KING'S COLLEGE LONDON

Alexander is Executive Chair of the International School for Government at King's College London. From 2014 to 2018, Alexander was Australian High Commissioner to the UK. Prior to this, he was Australia's longest-serving Minister for Foreign Affairs, a role he held from 1996 to 2007. Alexander also served as Opposition Leader and leader of the Australian Liberal Party from 1994 to 1995 and was Member of the Australian Parliament for Mayo for over 20 years.

In addition to a range of other political and diplomatic roles, he was Executive Director of the Australian Chamber of Commerce and the United Nations Secretary General's Special Adviser on Cyprus, in which he worked on peace talks between Greek and Turkish Cypriots. He is currently Chairman of the UK think tank Policy Exchange, a trustee of the International Crisis Group, and an Academic Bencher of the Honourable Society of the Inner Temple.



PROFESSOR JOANNE WALLIS

PROFESSOR OF INTERNATIONAL SECURITY IN THE DEPARTMENT OF POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Joanne Wallis is Professor of International Security in the Department of Politics and International Relations at the University of Adelaide. She is the author or editor of seven books, including Constitution making during State building (CUP 2014) and Pacific Power? Australia's Strategy in the Pacific Islands (MUP 2017). Joanne is the chief investigator on two Australian Research Council Discovery Projects, analysing Australian interventions in the Pacific Islands and the operation of the Australia-New Zealand alliance. She is also the chief investigator on a Defence Strategic Policy Grant analysing the potential of a networked security architecture in the Pacific Islands.

Joanne completed her PhD at the University of Cambridge as a Poynton Cambridge Australia scholar. She then spent more than eight years in the Strategic and Defence Studies Centre at the Australian National University. Before her PhD, Joanne completed Masters degrees in Arts and Law at the University of Melbourne and prior to that was a lawyer at Allens Arthur Robinson (now Allens Linklaters). Joanne has been a Fulbright Scholar at the Walker Institute of International and Area Studies at the University of South Carolina and a visiting scholar the East-West Center in Honolulu. She has also been a visiting scholar at the Australian Civil Military Centre and regularly briefs government agencies, appears before parliamentary committees, participates in international strategic dialogues, and delivers professional education programs.



PROFESSOR STEPHEN SMITH

CHAIR, UWA DEFENCE AND SECURITY INSTITUTE THE UNIVERSITY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Professor Stephen Smith has been a Professor of Public International Law at The University of Western Australia since 2014. He is currently the Chair of the UWA Defence and Security Institute, Chair of archTIS, Chair of Sapien Cyber, Chair of the Advisory Board of the UWA Public Policy Institute, a member of the Board of the Perth USAsia Centre, and a Member of the Board of the LNG Marine Fuel Institute.

Professor Smith was the federal member for Perth for the Australian Labor Party from March 1993 until September 2013. In a distinguished career spanning 20 years in the Australian Federal Parliament, Professor Smith served as the Minister for Defence, and prior to that, as Minister for Foreign Affairs and Minister for Trade. Following his retirement from the Australian Parliament in 2013, Professor Smith was a member of the EY (Ernst and Young) Oceania Government and Public Sector Advisory Board (2014–2017), Chair of the Asia Desk and a member of the Advisory Board of Perth Law firm Lavan (2014–2017), and a member of the Board of Hockey Australia (2013–2016).

Professor Smith completed his Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Laws at The University of Western Australia, and has practised as a barrister and solicitor in Perth. He completed a Master of Laws in Public International Law at London University, and subsequently lectured and tutored in Law in London.





PROFESSOR MELISSA DE ZWART FAAL

DEAN AND PROFESSOR OF LAW IN THE ADELAIDE LAW SCHOOL

THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Professor Melissa de Zwart FAAL is Dean and Professor of Law in the Adelaide Law School. She is an expert in legal issues arising from the use of cutting edge technology, particularly the internet and outer space. She is Deputy Chair of the Space Industry Association of Australia, Chair of the Council of Australian Law Deans, and a Board Member of the Australian Academy of Law. Melissa is also a Legal Officer in the Royal Australian Navy (Reserve). Prior to joining academia, she was the Manager, Corporate Legal Services, CSIRO, where she advised on intellectual property, trade secrets, commercialisation and contract. She has researched and taught in areas including internet law, commercial space law, international space law, social media, whistleblowing, surveillance, privacy, Big Data and technology and national security. Her most recent publications examine the implications of the Artemis Accords for Australian space activities and the commercial impacts of dual use space technology.



WING COMMANDER MARIJA JOVANOVICH

COMMANDING OFFICER 10 SQUADRON, TEST PILOT, ROYAL AUSTRALIAN AIR FORCE

Wing Commander Marija "Maz" Jovanovich is a military test pilot, commanding officer and the RAAF's most senior female pilot. As an operational pilot on the P3 Orion, she flew on operations and exercises all over the world, including the Middle East, southwest Pacific, southeast Asia – and of course the United States. In 2014, she was the first Australian in 25 years to graduate from USAF Test Pilot School. She is also a graduate of USAF War College. She holds multiple degrees in STEM and the humanities and has 3500 hours of flight experience, on over 30 different aircraft types.



EMERITUS PROFESSOR PURNENDRA JAIN

DEPARTMENT OF ASIAN STUDIES THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Purnendra Jain is Emeritus Professor in the Department of Asian Studies at the University of Adelaide. Recipient of the Japanese Emperor's Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Neck Ribbon in 2020, his main research focus has been on Japanese politics and foreign policy. Author, co-author and editor of 14 books and numerous research papers and articles, he has also researched and written extensively on the international relations in the Asia-Pacific/Indo-Pacific region. He is a frequent commentator on Asian current affairs in newspapers, online platforms, radio and television in Australia, Japan, India, Singapore and China.



DR MELISSA-ELLEN DOWLING

RESEARCH FELLOW THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Dr Melissa-Ellen Dowling is a Research Fellow at the University of Adelaide. Her research interests centre around democratic resilience, foreign interference, digital information operations, and national security policy. Currently, Dr Dowling is engaged in projects exploring cyber information operations and their impact on Australian democracy. She is Co-Investigator on a Defence-sponsored project, Countering Foreign Interference, which models democratic resilience to counter foreign interference in Australia and is also conducting research on the use of digital information warfare techniques by non-state actors. Dr Dowling is the author of Writing Russia (Routledge, 2021), and has published commentary on digital disinformation with British Politics and Policy (London School of Economics), The Stretton Institute (The University of Adelaide), and the Australian Journal of International Affairs.



PROFESSOR ADAM GRAYCAR

PROFESSOR OF PUBLIC POLICY AND DIRECTOR OF THE STRETTON INSTITUTE THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Adam Graycar is Professor of Public Policy and Director of the Stretton Institute at the University of Adelaide (Australia). He has had careers in both academia and government. He has worked in universities in Australia, Europe, USA and Asia. While Professor at the Australian National University he was the founder of the Transnational Research Institute on Corruption.

He acquired extensive policy experience over 22 years in the various senior level posts he has held in both in the Commonwealth and the South Australian Governments. He has two doctorates from the University of NSW, is the author of some 300 scholarly publications, and is a Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia. In 2020 he was the co-winner of the International Anti- Corruption Excellence Award (Academic Research and Education).



DR ZAC ROGERS

RESEARCH LEAD

JEFF BLEICH CENTRE FOR THE US ALLIANCE IN DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY, SECURITY, AND GOVERNANCE , FLINDERS UNIVERSITY

Dr Zac Rogers PhD is Research Lead at the Jeff Bleich Centre for the US Alliance in Digital Technology, Security, and Governance at Flinders University of South Australia. His research combines a traditional grounding in national security, intelligence, and defence with emerging fields of social cybersecurity, digital anthropology, and democratic resilience. Currently lead researcher in a fully funded three year defence/ academic collaborative project exploring the impact of digital transformation from infrastructure to the human/computer interface on Australia's internal and external security, national interests, defence planning, and strategy.



ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR TIM LEGRAND

THE DEPARTMENT OF POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Associate Professor Tim Legrand joined the Department of Politics and International Relations at the University of Adelaide in July 2018. His research is concerned with national and international dimensions of global security decisionmaking, particularly in transnational networks and institutions. His work traverses a range of security themes, principally in global blacklisting and sanctions, cyber security and critical infrastructure, terrorism, political violence and political exclusion. This research is oriented around a cross-pollination of public administration (law, sociology and public policy) literatures and International Relations (critical security studies, global governance) perspectives to navigate the complex terrain of security in domestic and international spaces.

Tim is the author or editor of five books, including Banning Them, Securing Us? Terrorism, Parliament and the Ritual of Security (with Lee Jarvis, Manchester Uni Press, 2020) and The Architecture of Policy Transfer (Palgrave, 2021) as well as more than forty journal articles and book chapters. He has previously held research and lecturing positions in the National Security College at the Australian National University, the ARC Centre of Excellence in Policing and Security at Griffith University, and visiting research fellowships at the Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris (Sciences Po), Johns Hopkins University, the University of East Anglia and the University of Stockholm.





PROFESSOR PETER DRAPER

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR THE INSTITUTE FOR INTERNATIONAL TRADE THE UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE

Peter is a member of the Board of Trustees of the International Chamber of Commerce's Research Foundation; non-resident senior fellow of the Brussels-based European Centre for International Political Economy; Associated Researcher at the German Development Institute (DIE); and a Board member of the Australian Services Roundtable.

In 2020 he was co-chair of the Saudi Arabia-led Think 20's Task Force 1 on Trade and Investment. For ten years he was, respectively, member, chair, vice chair, and co-chair of the World Economic Forum's Global Future Council on the Global Trade and FDI system. He was also Senior Research Fellow at the South African Institute of International Affairs. Previously, in South Africa's national Department of Trade and Industry he was head of bilateral economic relations East Asia then Mercosur), and head of the economic analysis and research unit in the Department's International Trade and Economic Development Division. Prior to that he was an academic teaching economic history and political economy, and headed the Department of Economics and Economic History at the then University of Durban-Westville (now University of KwaZulu-Natal). He is a recipient of an honorary Doctorate degree from the Friedrich-Schiller-University in Jena, Germany.
