SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

PROFESSOR PETER DEAN

DIRECTOR, FOREIGN POLICY AND DEFENCE, THE UNIVERSITY OF SYDNEY

Professor Peter J. Dean is the Director of Foreign Policy and Defence at the United States Studies Centre at the University of Sydney. Prior to this he was Chair of Defence Studies, Director of the UWA Defence and Security Institute, and a Senior Fellow at the Perth USAsia Centre and Pro Vice-Chancellor (Education) at UWA. He has been a Fulbright Professional Fellow and Endeavour Research Scholar in Australia-United States Alliance Studies, as well as a non-resident fellow with the Centre for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS) and the Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Studies at Georgetown University in Washington D.C. Professor Dean was the founding editor of the Melbourne University Press Defence Studies series, is a member of the Editorial Board of the Australian Army Journal, Global War Studies and the Military Studies Journal, and a former managing editor of the journal Security Challenges. An international award-winning author, his most recent book (with Brendan Taylor and Stephan Fruhling) is After American Primacy: Imagining the Future of Australia's Defence, (Melbourne University Press, 2019).





MR GREG MORIARTY

SECRETARY OF DEFENCE, DEPARTMENT OF DEFENCE

Mr Moriarty commenced as Secretary of the Department of Defence on 4 September 2017. He first worked in Defence from 1986 to 1995, primarily in the Defence Intelligence Organisation. He also served in the Headquarters of the United States Central Command in the Persian Gulf during Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. Prior to his appointment as the Secretary of Defence, Mr Moriarty held senior roles in the Prime Minister's office, first as the International and National Security Adviser and then as Chief of Staff to Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull. In June 2015 Mr Moriarty was appointed Commonwealth Counter-Terrorism Coordinator in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet. Mr Moriarty was responsible for coordinating and implementing Australia's counter-terrorism arrangements, in close partnership with the States and Territories.

Mr Moriarty has extensive experience within the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), and served in a number of senior roles, including as Deputy Secretary (2015), Ambassador to Indonesia (2010–2014), First Assistant Secretary, Consular Public Diplomacy and Parliamentary Affairs Division (2009–2010), Assistant Secretary, Parliamentary and Media Branch (2008–2009), Ambassador to Iran (2005–2008), Assistant Secretary, Maritime South East Asia Branch (2002–2005), and as the Senior Negotiator with the Peace Monitoring Group on Bougainville.

Mr Moriarty holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree with Honours from The University of Western Australia and a Masters Degree in Strategic and Defence Studies from the Australian National University. He is married with two children. Mr Moriarty has studied Indonesian and Tok Pisin.



MR PETER TESCH

DEPUTY SECRETARY STRATEGY, POLICY AND INDUSTRY, AUSTRALIAN DEPARTMENT OF DEFENCE

Mr Tesch was appointed Deputy Secretary on 1 May 2019. As Head of the Strategy, Policy, and Industry Group he is responsible for:

- devising strategy to give effect to government intent;
- setting the policy frameworks to govern ADF operations and Defence international engagement; and
- · working closely with industry to deliver ADF capability and national economic growth.

Strategy, Policy, and Industry Group sits at the core of the Strategic Centre. Mr Tesch's group also rigorously contests the enterprise's decisions and advice to government to ensure quality outcomes and optimise the impact and benefits of government's \$575 billion investment in Defence.

Mr Tesch comes to this role following a 32-year career as a senior officer with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT). He most recently served as Australia's Ambassador to the Russian Federation from March 2016 until April 2019. Prior to this, he held several executive positions in DFAT, including as First Assistant Secretary International Security Division from January 2014 to December 2015. Mr Tesch has also previously served in the Office of the Minister for Trade (1993–1994).

He has previously represented Australia overseas as Ambassador to Germany (2009–2013); Commissioner-General for the Shanghai 2010 World Expo (2008–2009); Deputy Permanent Representative to the United Nations, New York (2002–2005); Deputy Commissioner-General at the Expo 2000, Hanover (1999–2000); Ambassador to Kazakhstan (1997–1999); and Third Secretary, Moscow (1989–1991).

Mr Tesch holds a Bachelor of Arts degree with Honours from the University of Queensland. He speaks German and Russian.

DR LAUREN BAIN

ASSISTANT SECRETARY, AUKUS INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT BRANCH DEPARTMENT OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND TRADE

Dr Lauren Bain was appointed to the role of Assistant Secretary, AUKUS International Engagement Branch at the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) in November 2021. Before that, as Assistant Secretary of the ASEAN and Regional Architecture Branch, she led Australia's engagement with ASEAN and the Quad.

Dr Bain has served overseas in Berlin (2016-2019), Jakarta (2013-2016) and Kuala Lumpur (2004-2007). In Canberra she has served as an Adviser to the then Minister for Foreign Affairs (2012-13) and as Director of DFAT's Vietnam, Myanmar and Laos Section (2010-12).

Before joining DFAT in 2003, she worked for Asialink at the University of Melbourne and for the Victorian State Government. While completing a doctorate in Indonesian Studies, she taught Southeast Asian Politics at the University of Melbourne.

She speaks professional-level Indonesian and competent German, and lives in Canberra with her husband Andreas Radtke and three children.



MR LEIGH DAWSON

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT SPECIALIST, U.S. CONSULATE GENERAL PERTH

Leigh Dawson (Public Engagement Director, U.S Consulate Perth) serves as the leading strategist for CG Perth's public diplomacy engagement, designing and recommending PD strategies to connect with audiences to promote understanding of and support for U.S. policy. A graduate journalist, Leigh worked as a reporter in Port Hedland (WA), before transitioning to Communications and Public Affairs in higher education at Notre Dame University (WA) and Monash University (VIC). Leigh is currently undertaking his Master's in International Affairs at King's College London. He is also a qualified AFL umpire, a not-so-qualified coffee connoisseur and pizza critic, and loves to travel.



MS BIBI VOYLES

POLITICAL COUNSELOR, UNITED STATES EMBASSY CANBERRA

Bibi Voyles is the Political Counselor at the United States Embassy in Canberra where she leads a team focused on AUKUS and the Quad. She served previously as special assistant to the State Department's top diplomat for East Asian and Pacific Affairs, oversaw global China strategy on the China Desk in Washington, and supported the Trans-Pacific Partnership negotiations in Tokyo. During a year-long diplomatic exchange fellowship with the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs, she advanced cooperation with the Pacific and Southeast Asia, including on climate change and maritime assistance. A consular tour in Chennai opened up temporary duty assignments to Brasilia and Colombo. Before joining the Foreign Service, Bibi consulted in the banking and transportation sectors in Pittsburgh, Seattle, and Chicago. She was raised in Pakistan, Brazil, and the United States, and makes clumsy attempts at speaking Urdu, Portuguese, Spanish, Japanese, French, and Chinese. Bibi obtained a Bachelor's degree in International Relations and Economics from Georgetown University, an M.B.A. from Northwestern University, and an M.S. in Technical Communication from the University of Washington (with a delightful interlude at the University of Twente in the Netherlands). She is the recipient of multiple individual and group Superior and Meritorious Honor Awards, and in 2022 was selected for the Secretary's Leadership Seminar at Harvard Business School. MR JAMES BATLEY PSM

DISTINGUISHED POLICY FELLOW, ANU DEPARTMENT OF PACIFIC AFFAIRS

James Batley PSM has worked at ANU since 2015, teaching and researching on Australia's relations with the Pacific and on governance issues, particularly in Solomon Islands. Before that he had a career in government. He joined the Department of Foreign Affairs in 1984 and had early career postings in Vanuatu, Papua New Guinea and Indonesia. From 1997–1999 he was Australia's High Commissioner to Solomon Islands. From 1999–2002 he was head of Australia's diplomatic mission in Dili, becoming Australia's first Ambassador to East Timor at independence in 2002. From 2004–2006 he led the Regional Assistance Mission to Solomon Islands (RAMSI) and from 2007–2009 he was Australian High Commissioner to Fiji. In Canberra he worked in a range of senior positions including Deputy Director-General of AusAID (2011–2013) and Deputy Secretary of DFAT (2013–2014).



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DR ELIZABETH BUCHANAN

HEAD OF NAVY RESEARCH,
ROYAL AUSTRALIAN NAVY'S SEA POWER CENTRE

Dr Elizabeth Buchanan is Head of Navy Research at the Royal Australian Navy's Sea Power Centre. She was Lecturer of Strategic Studies at the Australian War College, Canberra, teaching into the Defence and Strategic Studies Course. She holds a PhD in Russian Arctic Strategy under Putin from the Australian National University. Dr Buchanan was recently the Maritime Visiting Fellow at NATO Defense College, Rome and is the co-founder and co-director of the Polar Warfare program at the Modern War Institute at West Point Military Academy. She is a Non-Resident Fellow of the Modern War Institute and a Non-Resident Fellow at the Griffith Asia Centre. Dr Buchanan is a core research member of the Russia Studies Group at the US Defence Department's George Marshall Centre. Her area of research interests include Arctic and Antarctic geopolitics, Russian foreign policy, energy geopolitics and maritime strategy. Dr Buchanan has two published books: Russian Energy Strategy in Asia (ANU Press) and Red Arctic (The Brookings Institution Press). She has two forthcoming books: How to Lose a Continent (Black Inc Press) on Antarctic futures and Competitive Cooperation at the Ends of Earth (Yale University Press). She has published in most recently in Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy, The Moscow Times, RUSI, and the War on the Rocks. Her academic publications include Australian Journal of International Affairs and International Affairs. She tweets at @BuchananLiz.

MS MERCEDES PAGE

FELLOW, THE SCHMIDT FUTURES INTERNATIONAL STRATEGY FORUM

Mercedes is a Fellow with the Schmidt Futures International Strategy Forum. She is the founder and former CEO of Young Australians in International Affairs. Mercedes previously worked for the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, where she held a number of roles including as one of the lead authors of Australia's 2021 International Cyber and Critical Tech Engagement Strategy. Prior to working at DFAT, she held a number of roles in the private and not-for profit sectors, and at the Australian Strategic Policy Institute. She was previously a non-resident WSD-Handa Fellow and a member of the Young Leaders Program at the Pacific Forum.

In 2021 she was presented with an Australian Leadership Award by the ADC Forum, and in 2020 was presented with a medal by H.E. General the Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Retd), Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia. She was a finalist in the 2019 Women's Agenda Leadership Awards and in 2018 was named by the *Financial Review* and Qantas as one of Australia's 100 Women of Influence. In 2015 she was recognised by the Foundation for Young Australians (FYA) as one of Australia's Top 50 Young Social Pioneers.

She holds a Master of Arts (International Studies), a Graduate Diploma (International Studies), Bachelor of Arts (Politics and Asian Studies) and a Bachelor of International Studies from the University of Adelaide.



DR TROY LEE-BROWN

RESEARCH FELLOW, UWA DEFENCE AND SECURITY INSTITUTE, THE UNIVERSITY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA

Troy Lee-Brown is a political scientist, researcher and sessional academic in security and International Relations. Troy's PhD research was undertaken at the University of Western Australia and his dissertation titled *The Rise and Strategic Significance of the Indo-Pacific* analysed the emergence and significance of the new regional construct.

Before joining UWA, Troy completed an MA in International Affairs at Murdoch University's Sir Walter Murdoch School of Public Policy and International Affairs in 2014, with a thesis examining the Senkaku-Diaoyu Islands dispute between Japan and China. Troy has authored several journal papers with a focus on security issues in the Indo-Pacific, regionalism and maritime security. His research interests include the Indo-Pacific concept, India, Japan, East Asia, regionalism, climate change, maritime and regional security.



PROFESSOR RORY MEDCALF AM

HEAD OF THE NATIONAL SECURITY COLLEGE, AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL UNIVERSITY

Professor Rory Medcalf AM is Head of the National Security College at the Australian National University. His career spans diplomacy, academia, intelligence analysis, journalism and think tanks, including with the Lowy Institute. Professor Medcalf was a senior strategic analyst with the Office of National Assessments, Australia's peak intelligence agency, and a diplomat with service in India, Japan and Papua New Guinea. He has played a lead role in Australia's informal diplomacy with India and a range of other countries. Professor Medcalf is recognised globally as a thought leader on the Indo-Pacific strategic concept, as articulated in his book *Contest for the Indo-Pacific* (published internationally as Indo-Pacific Empire). In June 2022 he was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia for significant service to international relations and tertiary education.

MS JACINTA CARROLL

SENIOR SECURITY, DEFENCE AND PUBLIC POLICY ADVISOR AND RESEARCHER, DEAKIN UNIVERSITY

Jacinta Carroll is an internationally recognised security and defence expert, with experience in the Australian government, thinktanks and universities. Her expertise is sought for comment and testimony on national security, defence, international security, terrorism and counter-terrorism, intelligence and international relations. Jacinta was the inaugural head of the Australian Strategic Policy Institute's Counter-Terrorism Policy Centre, Senior Fellow at the Australian National University's National Security College and holds Visiting Fellowships. She has been course convenor and lecturer for security professionals in Australia, Indonesia, the Philippines, Singapore, the USA, and the Middle East, and a keynote speaker at conferences around the world. She is an experienced board member.



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DR ALBERT PALAZZO ADJUNCT PROFESSOR, UNSW-CANBERRA

Dr Albert Palazzo is currently an Adi/Professor at UNSW-Canberra and formally was the long serving Director of War Studies for the Australian Army. He completed his PhD at The Ohio State University in 1996 and his dissertation was published as Seeking Victory on The Western Front. The British Army and Chemical Warfare in World War I. His publications include: The Australian Army: A History of its Organisation, 1901–2001, The Australian Army and the War in Iraq, and Planning to Not Lose: The Australian Army's New Philosophy of War. His book Climate Change and National Security: The Implications for the Military will be published by the US Army University Press later this year. His current research is the on the utility of the Strategic Defensive as Australia's defence policy.

DR LESLEY SEEBECK

INDEPENDENT CONSULTANT AND HONORARY PROFESSOR, **AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL UNIVERSITY**

Dr Lesley Seebeck is an independent consultant and Honorary Professor at the Australian National University. She headed the Cyber Institute at the ANU through to 2020, has held senior executive roles in the Federal Government, and has extensive experience in strategy. policy, defence, intelligence, budget, information technology and research roles in government, industry and academia. In 2017, she was recognised as Federal Government CIO of the Year. Dr Seebeck has a PhD in information technology, an MBA, a Masters in Defence Studies, a Bachelor's in Applied Science (Physics), and is a graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.



SENATOR JAMES PATERSON

SHADOW MINISTER FOR CYBER SECURITY, SHADOW MINISTER FOR COUNTERING FOREIGN INTERFERENCE, PARLIAMENT OF AUSTRALIA

Senator James Paterson is a Liberal Senator for Victoria. First elected in March 2016 at age 28, Senator Paterson is the youngest Liberal ever elected to the Senate.

During his time in the Senate, he has fought for Australia's prosperity, freedom, democracy and sovereignty.

Senator Paterson was appointed the Shadow Minister for Cyber Security and the Shadow Minister for Countering Foreign Interference by Opposition Leader Peter Dutton. Cyber attacks and foreign interference are two of the most serious contemporary threats to Australia's national security.

He was the Chair of the Parliamentary Joint Committee on Intelligence and Security from February 2021 until May 2022. During this time, Senator Paterson oversaw a record high workload in response to Australia's changing security environment, handing down 23 reports relating to Australia's national security in just 12 months.

Senator Paterson has also served as the deputy chair of the Senate Select Committee on COVID-19, the chair of the Joint Committee on Corporations and Financial Services and the Senate Finance and Public Administration Committee.

Senator Paterson is also the Australian co-chair of the Inter-Parliamentary Alliance on China; co-patron of Liberal Friends of Israel; and deputy chair of the Modest Members Society - a group of Coalition MPs committed to championing economic freedom.

Prior to entering the Senate, James was Deputy Executive Director of free market think tank, the Institute of Public Affairs. He previously worked for the Victorian Employers' Chamber of Commerce and Industry (VECCI), and in the office of Senator the Hon. Mitch Fifield. He has a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Commerce from the University of Melbourne.




MARCUS SCHULTZ
